Family Promise is a non-profit interfaith alliance that helps homeless families achieve lasting stability and self-sufficiency. Since 1995, it has provided a supportive environment for over 700 families during a stressful time of upheaval and trauma.

This unique shelter is comprised of a day center which has a children's playground and as well as basic supplies for the families at the center. A network of area faith congregations host shelter families at night on a weekly rotation. This faith-community response to homelessness utilizes the many resources congregations have to offer and provides a refuge for families in need.

## "Heretics and Infidels, the Changing Landscape of Religious Diversity"

#### Third Annual Neale Nelson Memorial Lecture University of Utah Memorial Library February 2, 2015



### "Jews in Utah? Not an Oxymoron!"

Jewish historian Rochelle Kaplan has been researching Utah's earliest Jewish history for a number of years and has discovered interesting new information about the state's Jewish "pioneering" forbearers. Her talk included many original photos, diaries and newspaper articles illustrating the important contributions of Utah's first Jewish immigrants. The Jews contributed much to the efforts of mining, butchering, retail, humanitarian efforts and the sciences, particularly health. They also contributed greatly to the political scene; one of the governors, several house representatives and a mayor or two were Jewish. Currently there are 2 Jewish representatives in the legislature. The Jews also established the Alta Club, Lagoon amusement park, The Odd Fellows and the Masonic Hall. Lastly, many of the prominent theaters and symphony venues in Salt Lake were directly attributed to the Jews like the Rose Wagner Performing Arts Center, the Abravanel Hall and others.

Mention was made of how Brigham Young played a part in the setting up of some of the major retail establishments in Salt Lake City and the establishments of the then major synagogues in Salt Lake and Ogden.

This original presentation was featured at the 2014 International Conference on Jewish Genealogy.
