The guest speaker was Dr. David A. Parker, a nationally recognized anti-bullying advocate. He is a professor of teacher education at the University of Utah, and associate director of the U's Eunice Kennedy Shriver National Center for Community of Caring Institute.

Dr. Parker related his personal experiences with bullying while growing up in New York City, and credits his mother with teaching him to find the positive, rather than negative, in trying circumstances. He asked everyone to look at each other as a human being who deserves respect and friendship.

He also announced that the National Center for Community of Caring will close on June 30. He said that he enjoys living in Utah, and wants very much to find a position that will allow him to continue his mission to eradicate bullying.

says Josie Stone, Interfaith Month Chair. As she told the Daily Herald newspaper, the idea came up in Interfaith Month event meetings, and committee members decided to give it a try. "I made some calls, and to my surprise, we got the rotunda."

Roundtable Board Member Lacee Harris conducted the ceremony, asking for peace and understanding among all creation. He is a member of Utah's Northern Ute and Northern Paiute tribes, and has also conducted prayers for the world during the annual Interfaith Musical Tribute and other Roundtable functions.

The hour-long program began with a greeting from Gov. Herbert. "I appreciate what you (Roundtable) stand for and what you represent. You have no idea how much it means to me to know that you care about me and you care about each other enough to pray for the governor and for the state. ...from time to time, we need outside help and guidance beyond our human abilities."

Roundtable Chair Alan Bachman followed the governor's welcome with a brief history of the Roundtable and also an explanation of the purpose of Interfaith Month. He then turned over the remaining time to Lacee to conduct the blessing.

Lacee wore ceremonial dress and decoration and welcomed attendees with a smile "...to my land. ...You were visitors, but you stayed. You are welcome anyway." He chanted the blessing in his native Ute language and waved an eagle wing fan as Roundtable members passed an unlit peace pipe around the circle.

His prayer asked his four brothers – the north, south, east, and west – to give their gifts to us. He explained that praying in the four directions was symbolic of the gathering of many faiths that morning. He also said that the pipe ceremony symbolizes our existence on Earth and ties to the Creator: "Spirituality has no boundaries. ... We are one."

The Roundtable Board thanks Gov. Herbert for taking time from his full schedule to participate in this event, and acknowledge the valuable assistance of his office staff.





"Women and Islam"

On Friday, February 8, a dinner and special lecture on "Women and Islam" was presented at the Pacifica Institute.

The evening's guest speaker was Prof. Sophia Pandya, who spoke before a packed room that included members of most of Salt Lake's faith communities. She is a Fulbright scholar who has researched Muslim women's changing religious practices in Bahrain; specifically the impact of education on women's religious activities, the topic of her new book.

Dr. Pandya is on the faculty of California State University at Long Beach, where she specializes in women, religion, and globalization. She holds a BA in Near Eastern Studies/Arabic from the University of California at Berkeley. She received her MA and Ph.D. from California State University in Religious Studies, with a focus on women and Islam.

"A Convening Conversation"

Human Rights Education Center of Utah

An interactive workshop, "A Convening Conversation: What could be possible across all faith traditions to relieve the chaos and uncertainty in our world?," was held Saturday, February 9, at St. Mark's Episcopal Church. Organizers Carla Kelley and Glen Brown of the Human Rights Education Center of Utah (HREC) led a dozen participants in this four-hour morning workshop in the church's Dean's Hall.

Activities included exercises intended to teach them how to transcend their differences. They also discussed faith and hope, and their perceptions of themselves and others, including their thoughts on finding common ground and becoming, as one person said, "...a voice for good."

"When 'Impossibilities' Happen"

A Christian Science lecture on "When 'Impossibilities' Happen, What's Behind It?" was presented on Tuesday, February 19.

According to Jon Benson, Christian Science lecturer and practitioner, people are looking for reliable healing that brings inspiration and meaning to their lives. "I've learned through personal experience that healing through prayer is reliable and lifechanging, even if the situation seems impossible."

Salt Lake's Christian Science Third Church sponsored his interactive talk, which was held at the Columbus Community Center. He explored two personal healings with outcomes thought impossible. "Investigating these healings reveals a Bible-based Science of God and man (you!) as His image. This Science, central to Jesus' healing ministry, is one you can put into practice in your own life."

Benson has served as a U.S. Army officer, university instructor, and managing director of a non-profit organization providing planning and management facilitation for governments and volunteer organizations in the developing world.



Pan Orthodox Vespers


Prophet Elias Greek Orthodox Church
