Pacifica Institute Hosts May Interfaith Monthly Luncheon

Roundtable Board Vice Chair Josie Stone welcomed members and community guests as she opened the final meeting of the 2012-13 interfaith year on behalf of Fr. Elias Koucos. She thanked Pacifica for hosting the May meeting, as they have done in past years, and for the wonderful food provided. The opening devotional was given by a Pacifica member.

While guests enjoyed the delicious lunch of Turkish cuisine, a slide show of photographs from various 2013 Interfaith Month events was presented.



The main speaker was Coskun Kariparduc, President of the Pacifica Institute Utah Branch, who presented a wonderful slide show produced by the Pacifica Institute headquarters, showing the scope and purpose of the institute and the Anatolian culture and faith. The highlights included the institute's speaker forums and cooking classes, which offer an opportunity for different faith groups to experience Turkish foods. The institute favors interfaith outreach and interaction, and they also share their major festivals, including Ramadan.

Afterward, guests rose and introduced themselves and the faith or organization they represented. Some also took the opportunity to talk about their organization's community work and announce upcoming events.

In addition, Beth Ehrhardt of the St. Joseph Villa Foundation for Charity Care announced that the foundation will be changing their name soon in order to give greater clarity about their mission in the community. Utah National Guard Breaks Ground for New Worship Center



Roundtable members were invited by the Utah National Guard to attend the ground-breaking of the new Camp Williams Sunrise Hall Worship Center, Wednesday, June 5.

Major Gen. Jefferson Burton, Utah National Guard adjutant general presided over the groundbreaking ceremony, which included an approximately 200 dignitaries, uniformed soldiers and friends on a hot summer afternoon.

The actual breaking of ground was carried out by 17 individuals, each equipped with a gold-painted shovel, who together lined up facing the flags of the United States, state of Utah and the Utah National Guard.

Among the Roundtable members who participated in the actual groundbreaking by plunging their shovels into the loose dirt were Osman Ahmed, Islamic Society of





Greater Salt Lake; Libby Hunter, Deacon, St. Mark's Cathedral; and Rev. Matt Seddon; St. Stephen's Episcopal Church, West Valley.

The new worship hall will overlook Utah Lake, with the Wasatch Mountains as a backdrop.

The existing chapel at Camp Williams has needed to be replaced for several years. Because National Guard funds cannot be used for the building of military chapels, donors were sought to help finance the \$2 million needed for the new construction. The principal donors include the Larry H. Miller Group of Companies, Zions Bank, Bott Pantone Architects, Stallings Construction and the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.



Christian Science Lecture

"The Miracle of Military Chaplaincy: People of Faith Uniting to Pray for our Members in Military Missions"

July 19, 2013

Retired Colonel and former Army Chaplain Janet Horton addressed a multi-denominational audience at Salt Lake's Christian Science Church Second Church. Guests were welcomed with a complimentary boxed lunch.

Roundtable member and Second Church member Scott Hansen introduced Col. Horton, the first woman promoted to colonel in the Army Chaplain Corps and the first woman assigned as a Division or Corps Chaplain.

She began her talk by helping listeners to understand the necessity of chaplains in the military, especially since personnel are assigned to places around the world where an individual's faith may not be represented or there may be a language barrier. She broke her stories down into examples of seeing, hearing and feeling from a spiritual point of view. As a Christian Scientist, she related stories of the power of healing as well as prejudices she experienced as a result of her faith.

As an Executive Director of the Armed Forces Chaplains Board, she was asked to

speak with a visiting Bosnian group who wanted to know how Americans of so many different religions could live and work together and not kill each other. She said, "I knew that I personally couldn't answer such a penetrating question in a satisfying manner." She recalled how, in the Bible, Solo-

mon asked for wisdom, and so she turned to God for guidance. She explained that, "In America, nothing is more sacred and personal than an individual's relationship with God ... and that we consider our military stronger and more effective when everyone was able to worship and practice their prayer disciplines in the manner they treasured."

She went to explain how in the Albanian mission she was able to convince the leaders to have dedicated worship spaces in their task force, and also how they assembled a deployable chapel on which soldiers volunteered to work additional hours to complete, despite having already worked inordinate hours in combat.

She also told guests that in the Kosovo mission she helped the General understand why the United Arab Emirates needed a separate place to pray. A place was created for the Muslims to pray, which made an impression on the Muslims in the Allied forces involved in the peacemaking missions. The Bosnians began to grasp that the desire to understand each others' love for God, had united them.


She continued with many stories during the lunch hour, which helped listeners to see the power of God working in all aspects of life, whether it be the healing of a cut on the finger, a prayer to bring a dog back to life, or helping a classmate with changing his relationship with his daughter by simply taking the time to really listen to her. The lecture was followed by time for questions and answers.


Leslie Dorius-Jones continues as Recording Secretary.
